

# **Infrastructure Funding Statement**

Report for Financial Year 2020/21



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#### Introduction

The Infrastructure Funding Statement sets out details of receipts from both Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) and planning obligations (also referred to as S106 agreements) and anticipated expenditure. The intention is to provide clarity and transparency to local communities and developers on the infrastructure and expenditure and in aligning this to planned development. The Statement also offers an opportunity to re-assess CIL expenditure priorities in the light of any change in circumstances or evidence.

The CIL Regulations (2010) require CIL charging authorities to publish an annual Infrastructure Funding Statement by 31st December each year. The scope and format of the Infrastructure Funding Statement is shaped by the requirements of the CIL Regulations (2010).

This is the second Infrastructure Funding Statement for Chesterfield Borough.

This report covers the period 1st April 2020 – 31st March 2021.

- 1.1 The purpose of CIL is to help to provide the infrastructure needed to support the development of the Borough. CIL receipts (excluding 15% for the neighbourhood element and administration fees) are held in a centralised pot and will be used to fund the delivery of strategic infrastructure across the Borough.
- 1.2 The Council's Infrastructure List is a statement of the infrastructure projects or types of infrastructure which the Borough Council intends will be, or may be, wholly or partly funded by CIL.
- 1.3 When the Chesterfield CIL charging scheme was introduced in 2016, the Infrastructure List (known as the "Regulation 123 List") set out the types of infrastructure on which CIL revenue would be spent. The infrastructure list provided clarity on what CIL might be spent on and ensured that there was no duplication between CIL and S106 agreements in funding the same infrastructure projects, a requirement of the CIL Regulations at that time. The amendments to the CIL Regulations which took effect on 1st September 2019 deleted Regulation 123 Lists and replaced them with Infrastructure Funding Statements (IFS).
- 1.4 Currently there is no evidence to suggest the need for an immediate review of infrastructure spending priorities. The Infrastructure Strategy & Delivery Plan (IDP) was updated in support of the new Local Plan (adopted July 2020. The IDP identifies the essential strategic and local infrastructure which will be required at different times over the duration of the plan period to deliver the Plan strategy. It sets out what infrastructure will be needed and when, who will deliver it and how it will be funded. The IDP will continue to be updated in support of a future Local Plan review. The Infrastructure Strategy and Delivery plan was reviewed and updated in support of the Local Plan. The Infrastructure List remains consistent with these priorities and therefore the original CIL expenditure priorities remain valid, pending a further future review.
- 1.5 The Infrastructure List is set out below. The List will be reviewed each year and published in the annual Infrastructure Funding Statement.

### 2.0 Background

- 2.1 The Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) is a mechanism to allow local planning authorities to raise funds from new development, in order to contribute to the cost of infrastructure projects that are, or will be, needed to support new development.
- 2.2 The Community Infrastructure Levy Regulations 2010 (as amended) (Regulation 62) require Infrastructure Funding Statements to include a report on specific items of CIL income and expenditure for each financial year. Parish and Town Councils must produce their own CIL reports (under Regulation 62A).
- 2.3 CIL took effect in Chesterfield Borough on all CIL-liable development which was granted from 1<sup>st</sup> April 2016. Therefore 2020/21 is the fifth financial year in which CIL has been charged and in which CIL payments were collected.

- 2.5 Future CIL expenditure will take place in accordance with the CIL Expenditure Strategy approved by Cabinet in July 2018(<a href="https://www.chesterfield.gov.uk/media/759153/cil-expenditure-strategy.pdf">https://www.chesterfield.gov.uk/media/759153/cil-expenditure-strategy.pdf</a>). The CIL Expenditure Strategy sets out the process which the Council will follow in identifying the specific items of infrastructure upon which CIL revenue will be spent in order to support growth and development across the Borough.
- 2.6 In future reporting years where there are monies that have been

spent/transferred, the Infrastructure Funding Statement will set out the details. The Council has approved further expenditure during 2021/22 and this will be reported in the next Infrastructure Funding Statement.

### **CIL Neighbourhood Portion**

2.7 The Community Infrastructure Levy Regulations (Regulation 59A) place a duty on charging authorities to allocate at least 15% (up to a cap of £100 per existing council tax dwelling) of CIL receipts to spend on priorities that should be agreed with the local community in areas where development is taking place. This is known as the neighbourhood portion.

#### A. Parish Areas

- 2.8 The 2010 Regulations require charging authorities to pass the 15% of CIL receipts directly to parish councils where the chargeable development has taken place. Parishes can contribute towards strategic projects but are ultimately autonomous in taking spending decisions.
- 2.9 In the two parish areas of the Borough, Staveley and Brimington, the neighbourhood portion of CIL receipts is passed to Staveley Town Council or Brimington Parish Council where chargeable developments take place in their areas. Staveley Town Council or Brimington Parish Council have a duty to report annual CIL income and expenditure.

#### B. Non-Parish Areas

- 2.10 Where CIL-chargeable development takes place in a non-parish area, the Council retains the levy receipts but must spend the neighbourhood portion on, or to support, local infrastructure, or anything else that is concerned with addressing the demands that development places on an area. Funds from the neighbourhood portion can be used for a wider range of spending than is the case with the strategic portion.
- 2.11 A CIL Neighbourhood Fund has been established to fulfill this purpose, managed through the Health & Wellbeing Partnership.
- 2.12 The following table summarises the awards which were made from, this fund in 2020/21.

### **CIL Receipts**

2.13 CIL contributions are payable upon commencement of all CIL-liable schemes permitted since 1<sup>st</sup> April 2016. CIL revenues have accumulated steadily as further CIL-liable developments have reached commencement stage. Table 1 below shows a summary of the CIL monies received in 2020/21 financial year. A more detailed breakdown is provided in Table 2.

- 3.1 Planning obligations are an important funding stream to help provide the infrastructure needed to support new growth and development. Planning obligations are also referred to as 'Section 106 Agreements' or 'developer contributions'.
- 3.2 A planning obligation is a legal obligation under Section 106 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 to mitigate the impacts of a new development. S106 agreements are most commonly agreed between the local authority and a developer and are attached to a planning permission.
- 3.3 Planning obligations help to mitigate the impact of a development to make it acceptable in planning terms. Planning obligations may only constitute a reason for granting planning permission if they meet the 3 statutory tests as set out in the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) Regulations 2010 (as amended)<sup>16</sup> and in paragraph 56 of the NPPF. The legislation requires that every planning obligation must be:
  - necessary to make the development acceptable in planning terms,
  - directly related to the development, and
  - fairly and reasonably related in scale and kind.
- 3.4 In addition to the Borough Council entering into planning obligations,
  Derbyshire County Council is also responsible for delivering and operating
  specific areas of large-scale infrastructure required to support development,
  including as highways, schools, libraries, and waste. The County Council's
  requirements for S106 contributions are set out in its <u>Developer Contributions</u>
  <u>Protocol</u>. The County Council is also required to publish its own <u>Infrastructure</u>
  <u>Funding Statement</u>. The Borough Council works closely with the County
  Council's Planning Services to identify the impact of proposed development
  and ensure the infrastructure requirements needed to support development
  are identified through the Local Plan process.
- 3.5 The S.106 Report for 2020/21 is set out below. The details are based on the requirements of the CIL Regulations 2010 (as amended).

# **Monitoring and Review**

The information in the Infrastructure Funding Statement will feed into the review of the Chesterfield Local Plan and future CIL reviews to ensure that policy requirements for developer contributions remain realistic and do not undermine the deliverability of the Local Plan.
