Foreword

Chesterfield is a place built on long-standing and far-reaching partnership networks, which are underpinned by a shared commitment to put our communities first.

We worked together effectively to make a difference to the lives of people who live, work, study, visit and do business here – and are well positioned to make the most of the opportunities in front of us now, and in the future.

It was this shared vision, commitment, and drive to make things happen, that has been at the heart of our successful UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF) story. In spring 2022 Chesterfield Borough Council secured a total of £2.693m to deliver a range of priority projects from December 2022 to March 2025. The programme was then extended for another year until March 2026, with a further £1.1m allocated.

Our aspirations were set out in our investment plan to Government under the three key themes of the UKSPF initiative:

Communities and place

Supporting local business

People and skills

The council was identified as the lead authority for delivery – and we moved quickly to assemble key partners to form the UKSPF Partnership Board, and ensure joint working was at the centre of our approach.

Together we joined forces with a whole host of other local partners from the public, private, business, community and voluntary sectors to bring our shared plans to life and make a real difference on the ground.

Under the communities and place theme, we have supported our people and encouraged places to thrive, with grassroots projects which have touched lives across all generations and within some of the most deprived areas in our borough – reigniting a sense of community and connection.

From budding business brains taking the first step to making their dreams a reality, to long standing local entrepreneurs building on existing success, our UKSPF business-focussed initiatives have helped drive growth, jobs, skills and innovation across the borough – building a lasting legacy for success.

And at the heart of our work under the people and skills theme is opportunity; providing tailored employment and skills support to break down the barriers to work or offer support to cultivate career aspirations for the future.

It was a great privilege to act as Chair of this partnership. Here we reflect on the success of all of our collective achievements over the past few years, following the UKSPF programme ending in March 2026.

The power of the partnerships we formed will make a lasting impact on the borough. I am proud to say that since the beginning of the UKSPF programme in 2022 to its close in 2026, £3.794 million has been allocated to a variety of worth-while and inspiring businesses and community organisations, as well as individuals that have each been able to build and develop in a range of positive ways.

How we made a difference

A total of £349,000 has been awarded to local community groups and voluntary organisations since our Community Grants Fund scheme opened in 2023 - helping them to deliver key projects that have a positive impact on local communities.

Grants were used to deliver projects that build resilient, healthy, and safe neighbourhoods right across the borough - from providing funding to set up foodbanks or community hubs that allow people to come together, to helping deliver events in local communities and helping local people get back in to work.

Duckmanton Miners Welfare Centre a charity which provides social, recreational and cultural facilities for people living in the area.

Funding secured through the scheme has allowed the main room at Duckmanton Miners Welfare to undergo a major facelift - creating a modern space that can be used as a social gathering point for residents to come together to take part in events and activities.



Treasures Nursery – supporting a stronger start in life

Project: **Treasures Nursery, Staveley**

Support: **Community grant award of £3,746**

Delivery partners: **Chesterfield Borough Council, Edge Ministries, Treasure Nursery**

How we made a difference

The mini allotment project at Treasures Nursery in Staveley is one example of how this investment supported local children – many from low-income families and who have little or no outside space at home.

Through practical sessions on the allotment, youngsters are learning about fresh home-grown food and healthy, balanced diets.

Kitted out with safety gear and tools provided by the project, and protected by a new outdoor shelter, the children get stuck in to planting, growing and harvesting their own fruit and veggies – learning valuable new skills and knowledge through fun and practical activities.

“We are a charitable organisation providing childcare and education to children up to five years. We have created a mini allotment on a piece of land at the back of Edge Ministries.

“Some children show a low understanding of where healthy food comes from. Many don’t have a balanced diet, and also live in flats or have no useable green space at home. The children show great enjoyment and enthusiasm in looking after the allotment.”

Solar panels installed on two community buildings to cut costs and carbon emissions

Theme: **Communities and Place - Community grants**

Project: **Installation of solar panels**

Support: **Funding paid for solar panels to be added to two local buildings, helping them to lower their energy costs**

Delivery partners: **Chesterfield Borough Council**

How we made a difference

Two community buildings in Chesterfield are cutting carbon emissions and reducing running costs after installing solar panels, supported by Chesterfield Borough Council's Community Grants Fund.

Loundsley Green Community Trust and the Cosy Hub in Grangewood will use the renewable electricity generated across the year to improve energy efficiency, helping to keep their spaces warm and welcoming while reinvesting savings into community activity.

Loundsley Green Community Centre received £19,035 towards the installation, while the Cosy Hub received £9,000.

This investment in our space is already making a real and positive difference to our running costs. Our community development programme helped to grow community-led projects with local groups and organisations at their core – providing help and hope to some of the borough's most vulnerable communities.

Partners worked with former mining communities like Duckmanton and Poolsbrook to improve local services and activities, and brought people together to re-build strong local connections and create a shared vision for the future.

In Staveley, UKSPF funding helped Edge Ministries work with Poolsbrook Club Community Committee to create a stronger community focus. See the smiles being raised by this project in our video case study by scanning the QR code on the opposite page.

Putting families first with improved neighbourhood play spaces

Theme: **Communities and Place**

Project: **Parks, open spaces, and sports facilities**

Support: **Improving play spaces, sports facilities and green spaces across the borough**

Delivery partners: **Chesterfield Borough Council**

How we made a difference

Through the course of UKPSF several parks and sports facilities have been improved across the borough creating safe and accessible spaces where families can spend time together.

These improvements differ across the borough and have included an improved BMX track, path improvements, tree planting but the most impactful improvements have been enhanced play spaces.

Play spaces have been upgraded across the borough one of the more recent examples is at Poolsbrook Country Park where works included new surfacing, a zip line, accessible swings, a roundabout, see saw and a giant climbing frame suitable for older children.

Works have also improved local parks like Heather Vale in Hasland, the upgrade has seen all new equipment installed that will ensure the neighbourhood play space is suitable for ages two to twelve.

Improving play spaces will ensure that children have a fantastic place to play in their community but also provides a key social space for both children and parents to come together. As well as improving life for our residents these improvements have helped Chesterfield double its numbers of green flag award winning parks.



Bringing Chesterfield town centre to life

Theme: **Communities and Place**

Delivery partners: **Chesterfield Borough Council**

Project: **Town centre animation and welcome**

Support: **Providing funding to host events in the town centre and improving the public realm**

How we made a difference

Funding has helped to create a buzzing town centre full of families and friends making memories together and supporting local businesses.

Several key town centre events were supported including Chesterfield's 1940s Market, Jurassic Chesterfield, Christmas events, Peddler Market and Chesterfield Glow Up.

Marking the completion of regeneration works in the Market, Chesterfield Glow Up attracted thousands of visitors into the town centre to view a unique light show that celebrated the borough's history.

These events have helped bring more people into the town centre. This has benefitted town centre businesses and market traders whilst also showing Chesterfield's new look town centre in its best light.

With the regeneration of the Market complete funding from UKSPF was used to help ensure it could successfully relaunch and put the final finishing touches on the space.

The funding helped secure new furniture which will enhance the space for visitors during events by providing seating and tables under the new canopies in New Square.

Together these investments will help provide Chesterfield Markets a good foundation for future growth which will help attract more visitors and benefit town centre businesses.



Creating safer communities

Theme: **Communities and Place**

Project: **Community safety initiatives**

Support: **Funding CCTV improvements, uniformed enforcement team, youth diversionary projects, Best Bar None and Safe Space**

Delivery partners: **Derbyshire Police, Chesterfield Community Safety Partnership**

How we made a difference

Working together to design out crime and make Chesterfield an even safer place was the focus of a range of UKSPF-funded initiatives – contributing to a 15 per cent reduction in anti-social behaviour.

Additional uniformed enforcement officers, funded through UKSPF and the Safer Streets initiative, created visible reassurance and took action where needed – creating a safer Chesterfield town centre.

UKSPF funding has contributed to the modernisation of our CCTV systems. We've introduced new digital and mobile camera technology which allows the council to work more efficiently with the police - creating a more responsive and effective tool to tackle crime and anti-social behaviour.

The nighttime economy also received a boost through initiatives like Best Bar None. A number of venues have now been awarded the accreditation – showing their commitment to reducing alcohol-related crime and disorder to create a safer environment for socialising.

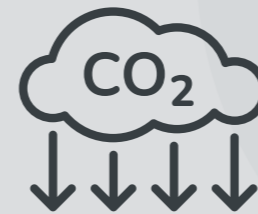

Chesterfield drum case maker doubles profit with council-backed support

How we made a difference

Hardcase International, the Chesterfield-based drum and percussion case manufacturer, has doubled profit and secured a strong pipeline of work after receiving specialist support through Chesterfield Borough Council's Innovation Support Programme.

Introduced to the programme in May 2024 following a referral from their accountants, the family-run business worked with the council's Innovation Support Project Manager Adrian to strengthen financial controls and rebuild momentum following disruption to live performance during the pandemic.

Support focused on improving cashflow management, rationalising pricing, clarifying roles and responsibilities, and mapping processes to remove bottlenecks while maintaining quality. Growth planning also explored customer segments and geography, alongside evaluating promotion through digital channels and brand ambassadors.

Now the company reports that profits have doubled, performance is on a growth track, and the order book shows around five months of future trade.

Paragon Products Strengthens Chesterfield Presence

How we made a difference

Paragon Products UK Limited is strengthening its presence in Chesterfield after relocating its distribution centre to the borough in early 2025.

Following initial recruitment, the business worked with the Skills Brokerage Service to identify further development opportunities for its team and operations.

Through a skills development and action planning session, tailored support was put in place, including the introduction of two T Level students on industry placements from digital and business programmes.

The students have been working on projects to improve performance monitoring systems and support sales growth, helping the business enhance its processes and build capacity for the future. Their contribution has already delivered noticeable improvements across the organisation, with their enthusiasm and fresh ideas making a positive impact.

The collaboration highlights the value of partnership working in helping businesses access local talent, develop skills and drive performance improvement in Chesterfield.

“Through the support of Chesterfield College and the local Skills Brokerage Service we have been able to bring in new skills to the business via the T level industry placement programme to help us develop our systems and processes. Local business growth takes centre stage

How we made a difference

Images Costumes designs and manufactures bespoke dancewear and logo uniforms.

Thanks to advice delivered by the Chesterfield Accelerator programme, the company has adopted new technology and is also taking steps to lower its carbon footprint.

Like most businesses, Managing Director Michelle Webb has faced rising costs which have had a challenging impact, particularly around reinvesting in staff and updating technology. Michelle worked with project business advisers to support growth and sustainability.

For example, it was identified that a new CAD system and software would improve pattern efficiency and development. Michelle was referred to the Made Smarter East Midlands digital adaption programme and supported to secure a £8,300 grant to buy new technology.

These streamlined processes, allowed the business to be more competitive. With this advantage, the support received is helping to safeguard and create new jobs. The company also received a grant for energy efficiency measures.

Derbyshire Start Up Support - getting great ideas off the ground

Theme: **Supporting local businesses – Derbyshire Start-Up project**

Project: **Heywood House Nursery, Brimington**

How we made a difference

The UKSPF-funded phase of the Derbyshire Start Up Project commenced in January 2024, helping businesses across the borough to turn their ideas into reality – and create new jobs and opportunities for local people.

Investment in the newly-opened Heywood House Nursery in Brimington has helped to create an exciting new outdoor play area – and with growing numbers of children in their care, the new venture is already growing its workforce.

Having bought a grade II listed building on High Street, the company undertook substantial renovation works to create a vibrant and welcoming children's nursery for youngsters aged from three months to five years old.

A business start-up grant of £10,000 allowed the gardens to be extensively renovated and landscaped so that the children can learn and develop in a secure green space – outdoors in nature, whilst having fun with their friends.

Learning in an outdoor environment has been shown to have both developmental and educational benefits and the nursery's striking feature now acts as a unique selling point, helping to set it apart.

Heywood House started operations with four staff, but this has now increased to seven. They have already exceeded expectations in terms of the numbers of children attending on a daily basis.

Business support in Chesterfield - helping established businesses to grow

How we made a difference

Bitz 'n' PC'z Ltd (trading as Black Swan Cyber Security) was started in 2006 by Kevin Walker, providing IT support services to schools and other educational organisations in and around Chesterfield. Today the business supports SMEs and not-for-profits with all kinds of cybersecurity solutions.

Changes within the client sector – together with the impact of rising energy costs and transport – were impacting the company's business model. Managing Director Kevin Walker reached out to the Accelerator programme for support to diagnose the issues and find a new route to where the business wanted to be.

New market opportunities, a new subscription-based business model and ways to generate extra revenue while reducing costs underpinned the new growth plan, and a package of support to help make this plan a reality was put in place.

This included a grant of £8,000, which has resulted in the development and launch of a new subscription-based eCommerce platform together with branding, messaging and multi-channel promotion to generate awareness, interest and sales.

Derbyshire Rail Industry Innovation Vehicle (DRIIVe)

How we made a difference

DRIIVe is a major regeneration project funded through the Staveley Town Deal. Funding from UKSPF has helped enhance this project and ensure it can help local people access the training they need to access careers in the rail sector.

The funding has been used to help complete the fit out of the building which will help enhance training provision on the site.

This will ensure that local people have access to high quality equipment which will help improve the learning experience.

DRIIVe will act as a catalyst for growth in the borough, helping to attract new businesses but also ensuring that local people have the skills they need to access great careers in the rail sector and improve their quality of life.



Construction Skills Hub expands with additional funding

Theme: **People and skills**

Project: **Future Skills Development Fund**

Support: **Creating new classroom facilities at the Construction Skills Hub**

Delivery partners: **Chesterfield College**

How we made a difference

The Construction Skills Hub has expanded with the creation of two new classroom spaces – creating an additional 45 training spaces at the site.

Based in Mastin Moor, the Construction Skills Hub is primarily funded through the Staveley Town Deal but additional funding from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund has allowed for its expansion.

The Construction Skills Hub is a sector specific training facility - over the next decade the Hub will provide careers insights, training and work experience for more than 5,000 learners from school age to adults seeking to re-skill.

Hub students gain real-world experience from day one, supported by industry-leading tutors and with direct access to employers. The hub's unique training model equips students with practical skills and knowledge that the sector needs to tackle the well-documented skills and recruitment gaps in construction.

The Hub is run in partnership between Chesterfield Borough Council, Chesterfield College and the University of Derby at the heart of Devonshire Groups development site at Mastin Moor.

The Construction Skills Hub received a total of £108,000 from UKSPF.

The two new classrooms will help the Hub support 45 additional students and launch new courses including adult skills courses and specific skill focused bootcamps. An additional cabin student support hub has also been created, to accommodate the additional staff needed to support the increased learner demand.

Integrated health and employment pilot supports economically inactive residents towards work

Support: **Funding helped people overcome health related barriers to work**

How we made a difference

Work With You supported residents with health-related barriers to find suitable employment.

Jacob* joined the project in August 2025 after experiencing social anxiety that made it difficult to leave home or speak to new people. Working one-to-one with his Employment Specialist, Jacob received tailored support to refresh his CV, develop a stronger cover letter, and explore realistic opportunities aligned to his interests.

As his confidence grew, Jacob was encouraged to attend Unstoppable Derbyshire – a programme for 18 - 21-year-olds that helps participants to identify and achieve their goals. Through Unstoppable, Jacob secured a fortnightly volunteering opportunity and established a positive routine that improves his wellbeing and employability.

“When I first joined the project [Work With You] I would have been far less happy to volunteer – my mindset wasn’t great. The only time I went out house was to see mum or go shopping. Now I do a course [Unstoppable] two days a week, volunteer every two weeks, and yesterday I went to see my mates at college. Before, I just bottled stuff up and only spoke to family. Keith has told me about all sorts of new places and opportunities to go and speak to and has given me the confidence to do so. I now have a routine, which makes me feel a lot happier with myself and encourages me to go out and do things.”

The Future Skills Development Fund was delivered with a range of training partners, in digital and manufacturing

Support: **Upskilling the workforce**

Delivery partners: **Chesterfield College, DBC Training and Chesterfield Manufacturing Forum**

How we made a difference

The project delivered a range of skills programmes within the workplace to help businesses upskill their workforce. This was delivered within two strands, one focusing on digital skills and one focussing on manufacturing including key science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) skills.

The digital programme provided vital digital skills training for businesses and their employees in Chesterfield, with a range of Microsoft programmes which are widely used across any industry.

The manufacturing programme was delivered in partnership with Chesterfield College and Chesterfield Manufacturing Forum. A dedicated classroom was put in place and programmes delivered to help upskill employees with STEM mentoring skills to support the development of the next generation.

“The course was very insightful. The part that stood out the most to me was the hands-on approach to learning. It provided a practical perspective that is directly applicable to my current role. Individuals in the workplace benefitted from low carbon and digital upskilling

How we made a difference

This project was designed to help local businesses strengthen their workforce skills in two key growth areas: low carbon and digital. Through funded training, participants were able to build practical knowledge in emerging technologies, sustainable construction methods and digital tools, helping employers respond to changing industry demands, improve productivity and prepare for a greener, more technology-driven economy.

Low carbon courses included:

- training on EV Charging installation
- hybrid vehicles
- air source heat pumps
- retro fit

Digital courses included:

- specialist training in AI
- digital marketing
- cyber security

Chesterfield Escape Rooms was one company who benefitted from training. The training introduced game changing tools like ChatGPT for marketing strategies and Gamma for improving promotional materials.
