Northern Gateway Enterprise Centre welcomes its first tenants

Chesterfield's new flagship enterprise centre, which will support new and expanding businesses to start and grow in the town, is now officially open and has welcomed its first tenants.

Roaring Mouse Public Relations has officially moved into the new building, with more companies, including East Midlands Chamber, already lined up to move in over the next few months

Councillor Tricia Gilby, Leader of the council, said: "The opening of the Northern Gateway Enterprise Centre represents the completion of the first phase of the Northern Gateway master plan. It will strengthen the local economy and support businesses as we recover from the effects of the pandemic.

"We've built on our experiences in Tapton Park and Dunston to develop this building and the demand we have seen from local businesses shows that we have been successful in creating a modern environment for companies to base themselves and to grow. I look forward to welcoming more tenants to the centre over the coming months."



The enterprise centre includes 32 office suites in a range of sizes and all the hi-tech features that are required for modern

features that are required for modern businesses. It also has modern conferencing facilities allowing businesses to host hybrid meetings. It has secure cycle parking and shower facilities to allow tenants to bike to work – supporting low carbon transport options. There are also features like break out rooms where

This new centre builds on the success of Enterprise Chesterfield, which includes the council-run Dunston Innovation Centre and Tapton Park Innovation Centre. For many years these centres have offered excellent support and accommodation to innovative and growing businesses.

The building also boasts some great sustainability features which will help keep energy usage down and ensure the building is fit for the future.

It was funded through a grant from the Sheffield City Region Investment Fund, with additional funding provided by Chesterfield Borough Council.



Revitalising the Heart of Chesterfield

We're investing in our town centre to make sure it thrives for generations to come.

The £10.28m Revitalising the Heart of Chesterfield scheme will transform the look, feel and flow of the town centre – creating a contemporary market town built on our proud history and heritage.

We've been asking for your views on our plans, as part of a public consultation which was due to end as this edition of Your Chesterfield went to print.



What's happening?

We're focusing on the key areas of Rykneld Square, Corporation Street, Burlington Street, Market Square, New Square and the area around the Parish Church of St Mary and All Saints (Spire Walk).

The work will be carried out in phases – starting later this year and due for completion in 2025.

Proposals include:


- Significant improvements to Chesterfield's historic market grounds
- Re-imagined town centre spaces that can be used for attractions like markets, festivals, events and cultural celebrations
- Upgrades to Rykneld Square to help frame the iconic Crooked Spire as a key attraction
- More greenery, new paving, seating, lighting, signposting and street furniture to create betterlooking and better-connected spaces
- Improved lighting and digital connectivity

Together with the major refurbishment of Stephenson Memorial Hall on Corporation Street (which houses the Pomegranate Theatre and Chesterfield Museum) the project is being brought forward thanks to almost £20m which Chesterfield Borough Council secured from the Government's levelling up fund, plus additional money from the council

The project will complement ongoing and planned regeneration in other parts of the town, including the Northern Gateway and plans to transform the area around Chesterfield Station.

Stephenson Memorial Hall

As well as improving the town centre we're also investing £17.5m into a project to transform Stephenson Memorial Hall, which is home to the Pomegranate Theatre and Chesterfield Museum.

The plans aim to create a modern visitor experience in the heart of the town centre with a single entrance to both facilities, an expanded Pomegranate Theatre, a reconfigured museum, community spaces and a new café bar.

In March, Chesterfield Museum closed to begin moving the collection into secure storage. At the end of June the Pomegranate Theatre officially closed its door for the refurbishment, which will begin later this year and be complete by 2025.

Thanks to everyone who had their say

Thanks to everyone who took part in our recent consultation – your views will help shape the next stage of our proposals for the regeneration of the town centre.

Councillor Kate Sarvent, cabinet member for town centres and visitor economy, said: "We were really excited to share our proposals with the residents and businesses of Chesterfield, as well as those who work in and visit our borough.

"Thanks to everyone who took part – your views are really valuable to us. Our plans are currently at the concept stage and your feedback will help shape the next stage of our proposals, which we will share as soon as possible."

Whilst the Pomegranate Theatre is closed, many of the standout performances will be held in the Winding Wheel Theatre, including this year's Pantomime, Sleeping Beauty (see page 31 for more details).

As well as investment from the council, around £11m of levelling up funding will be used to support the refurbishment of the Grade II listed building. A further £695,000 has been provided from the Arts Council England's Capital Investment Programme. This will be used to improve ventilation in the Pomegranate Theatre and create a new Changing Places toilet in the building.

choose Chesterfield town centre

Dozens of new businesses have opened in Chesterfield town centre over the last year, and more than 300 across the borough since the start of the pandemic, in a positive trend which shows the town is still a go-to place for investment and innovation.

From a luxury dog emporium (shown above) to a captivating 'escape room' experience, plus a variety of new independent eateries, bars, boutiques, pop up shops and market stall ventures, Chesterfield town centre is not standing still.

Anthony Foster, the owner of Barkworthy Dog Emporium in Theatre Yard said: "It's fair to say we were captivated by the town immediately, its bustling market and quaint alleys which led us to all sorts of independent local shops. This immediately piqued our interest, for that is exactly what we planned to do - set up a quirky, emporium style outlet that catered for dog lovers everywhere, focused on natural and ethically sustainable products."

Louise Spence, Bistro Supervisor and Coordinator at Cibo, which opened on Low Pavement in May, said: "We are a great advocate of helping independent local businesses and encourage all of us to get behind local suppliers and companies, creating jobs for local people."

In addition to new businesses, since 2021 nine businesses have also expanded into larger premises in the town centre. These include Rebel Menswear, Pizza Pi, Vintage Tea Rooms, Bee-Orchid and Twelfth Craft.

Raj Dhir, owner of Rebel Menswear which expanded into a new larger unit on the corner of High Street and Packer's Row in March, said: "We believe in Chesterfield, and that's why we are spending roughly £500,000 on the store. Chesterfield as a community and town centre has always supported us so it's only right we invest back in the town centre and community. We believe the future of Chesterfield town is bright and will only get brighter as more investment is made into the town centre."

Councillor Kate Sarvent, cabinet member for town centres and visitor economy, said: "It's great to welcome new businesses to Chesterfield town centre and celebrate those who are expanding and investing in our town. We're making a significant investment across our town centre which will further boost business confidence by attracting more visitors and shoppers. Our town centre will be the go-to place to live, work, socialise and shop."

Discover the art in your neighbourhood

Since 1994 more than 70 pieces of public art have been created in Chesterfield, many of them paid for by developers through our 'percent for art' scheme, which operated until 2020.

It has led to the creation of a variety of artworks by internationally recognised artists including Barbara Hepworth, Stuart Marsh and Angela Connor, that are available for the public to view

Largest council housing development in a generation

Local families are settling into their new homes following the completion of the biggest council housing development in the borough for a generation.

A £4.1m development has seen 21 brand new properties constructed on the former Brockwell Court site in Loundsley Green – the latest development as part of the council's commitment to increasing the supply of affordable and accessible homes across the borough.

The new development, named Badger Croft, includes ten two-bedroom houses, six three-bedroom houses, four four-bedroom houses and one three-bedroom bungalow – all of which are for let to local families on the council's housing resister.

Councillor Chris Ludlow, cabinet member for housing, (shown above right) said: "This is the biggest council housing development of this generation, so it's a huge milestone in our efforts to increase the housing supply across the borough. We're pleased to see families now settling into their new homes.



"Creating attractive places for people to live is at the heart of what we do, and these new properties will provide affordable, modern and accessible homes for families in our borough."

In response to the climate emergency that was declared by council leaders in July 2019, the council is committed to

ensuring that all its housing stock is as energy efficient as possible.

Councillor Ludlow added: "It's really important that new developments in the borough take account of environmental issues – contributing to a more sustainable future for us all.

"Living in an energy efficient home is not only better for our planet, but also lowers running costs."

Each of the new properties have increased levels of insulation, and electric vehicle charging points have been installed on properties with driveways to support lower carbon transport options.

Whilst works were ongoing on site, the council's main contractor, Henry Boot Construction, worked with the local Holmebrook Conservation and Improvement Group to complete additional landscaping works and environmental improvements close to the new development that will enhance the wider local community. This included the creation of wildflower meadows and planting that will help boost biodiversity and support pollinators.

New artwork

A colourful new sculpture has also been installed at the heart of Badger Croft

The 3.4m tall steel structure – designed by artist Coralie Turpin – is decorated with a handmade mosaic design incorporating badgers and celebrating the nature associated with the site.





Latest milestone for council housing in Chesterfield

A breaking-ground event held on the site of a new housing development marked the latest milestone in the council's commitment to increasing the number of affordable council homes in the borough.

The construction of 10 new homes in Middlecroft is now underway as councillors joined representatives from Robert Woodhead Ltd – the council's main contractor for the project – on site at Wensley Way to kick-start the new project.

This latest development will see the addition of two three-bed bungalows on Rowsley Crescent, two two-bed bungalows on Court Place, four two-bed bungalows on Wensley Way and two two-bedroom houses on Paisley Close.

Each of the properties will benefit from high levels of energy efficiency, including enhanced levels of insulation and the installation of energy efficient boilers and lighting. An electrical vehicle charging point will also be installed at each property to help encourage people to opt for lower carbon transport options.

Each of the houses and bungalows will be fully landscaped with tarmac driveways and turfed lawns.

Councillor Chris Ludlow, cabinet member for housing, said: "We're really excited to watch the latest development progress. The new properties will provide affordable, modern and accessible homes for local people and the energy efficiency benefits will offer affordable warmth to our tenants whilst also allowing us to contribute to a more sustainable future for us all."

Council tenants offered incentives to downsize

Council tenants could benefit from a financial boost if they choose to downsize to a smaller home in the borough, under the Tenants Incentive Scheme.

The council is offering up to £2,500 to tenants who are looking to move to smaller accommodation which would better suit their housing needs, whilst also helping free up more family-sized homes across the borough.

The Tenants Incentive Scheme is completely voluntary and additional support can also be provided by the council if needed, such as help to arrange removals.

Councillor Chris Ludlow, cabinet member for housing, said: "As a council we offer secure tenancies where tenants live in the same property for a significant length of time. During this time, the family dimensions of the household can change, such as grown-up children moving out.

"As well as the incentives, there are also a number of health and wellbeing benefits that come with moving to a property that is more suitable. Living in a smaller property in one of our older person's housing schemes can make it easier for people to live independently and potentially tackle loneliness and isolation issues. We can also help tenants to find accommodation that has already been adapted to meet their health needs.

"In addition, we understand that it's a difficult time for many people as we are seeing a rise in the cost of living – including rapidly rising energy charges. While we would never expect people to downsize to a smaller property if it wouldn't meet their needs, if a household does have extra space that's not needed, then moving to a smaller home would come with built-in financial benefits, as smaller households are easier and cheaper to heat."

Communal space for meeting up with friends and neighbours

All 41 council homes for older people across the borough have been refurbished creating brighter, more easily accessible spaces designed to help people live independently - following a £3.8m refurbishment scheme by the council.

The project, which started in October 2017, has seen all of the older persons housing schemes refurbished and modernised by the council's contractor, Fortem Solutions Ltd. The investment supports the council's commitment to providing affordable, modern and attractive homes for local residents in every stage of life.



The properties at Mallard Court and Leander Court in Staveley are the latest and final homes for older people to undergo a facelift, with improvements which are designed to create a greater sense of community for residents tackling the loneliness and social isolation that some older people experience.





kitchen and lounge area, and each

bathroom has been converted into a wet room with an accessible shower.

Communal and outdoor areas have also been given a facelift to create brighter open spaces for residents to get together and socialise. In addition, links have been created between the two buildings to provide additional opportunities for residents to spend time together.

Landscaping work has also taken place to allow easier access for residents, whilst lifts have been installed inside the building for access to homes on the first floor. External works to the properties include the installation of new roof and cladding render to make the homes more energy efficient.

What's in your takeaway food?

Buying a takeaway meal is a treat for many of us. However, if you do have any food allergies you need to be aware of what ingredients are going into your favourite foods.

We work alongside colleagues from Derbyshire County Council's Trading Standards Department to assist food businesses and to make Chesterfield a safe place to eat out for all our residents and visitors – but you can do your bit too by asking the right questions at the point of ordering.

Councillor Jill Mannion-Brunt, cabinet member for health and wellbeing, said: "There are lots of different types of food-related allergies, so it is important to never be complacent and order a meal just because you've had it before and felt okay afterwards.

"Even if you are having your regular takeaway meal, it is always sensible to speak to the food outlet and advise them of your needs, as ingredients can change and have a direct impact on you as the consumer."

Ordering food to eat-out is considered distance selling which means allergen information must be made available before the purchase of the food is completed (at the point of sale), and when the food is delivered. This can be in writing, through a website, catalogue, or menu, or by having a discussion over the phone.

If you are ordering food for a number of people, ask the food retailer to label each container so you are aware what is inside and that it is safe for you to eat.

If you come across a business that is not meeting allergen guidance requirements you can make the Food Standards Agency aware by completing an online form here: www.food.gov.uk/contact/consumers/report-problem

Thousands of pounds of benefits go unclaimed each year because people find the benefits system too complicated and the forms too difficult to complete. Claiming benefits will make you better off each week and may help you get grants that are available.

We have a dedicated benefits advice service that can help check that you're receiving everything you're entitled to. This could include Housing Benefit, Universal Credit or help with your Council Tax bill. We also have discretionary payments to cover life's essentials, available for eligible residents who are in emergency need.

Chesterfield Climate Challenge

Climate change is the greatest challenge our planet has ever faced and it is one of the biggest concerns people across the UK have.

But there is lots we can do to make a real impact – small actions, taken together, add up to real change.

This summer we're asking our residents to take that first step - making changes to your lifestyle and taking part in activities that will help reduce the impact of climate change and slow the rise of global temperatures.

Councillor

"These small challenges that you can do together as a family aim to get you thinking about your carbon footprint and what more you can do to support our transition to a carbon neutral community. We've tried to keep them fun and engaging for everyone and I hope that lots of you will share your experiences of making these changes for our climate."

Walk or cycle journeys less than two

miles - transport is one of the major sources of carbon emissions in Chesterfield. By choosing to walk or cycle instead, you can reduce emissions whilst also boosting your health and wellbeing. It can also make journeys more exciting for children.

Look up Chesterfield Cycle Campaign online for maps and support to start cycling more.

Think about your heating - reducing how often you use your heating - or keeping it off during the summer if it's warm enough - will reduce emissions from your home. Try an extra blanket or more layers before switching the thermostat on.

Sow wildflower seeds - maintaining a healthy eco-system is vital to ensuring nature can thrive. Wildflowers support pollinators like bees and you can get seeds very cheaply. They can thrive in areas of your garden which are difficult to cultivate like dry ground, poor soil or slopes. There is a huge variety of wildflowers and identifying what you are growing can be a fun activity that can help children learn about plants native to the UK.

Make one day animal free - the production of meat and dairy is a key source of methane as well as emissions from transport and storage. Planning to have one day a week without eating animal products can be a fun challenge that lets you experiment with different types of food and cuisines.

Grow your own - the food we eat can have a big impact through both transport and packaging. By growing some of your own food instead you can reduce this impact, while learning new gardening skills! You don't even need a lot of space and can get started by growing salad, herbs and onions in containers. The Royal Horticultural Society has some great tips to help you start: www.rhs.org.uk/vegetables

Join a community litter pick - litter has a huge impact on the environment, making our communities look unclean and harming nature. There are some great local groups that organise regular litter picks that you can join and help. Search for Chesterfield Litter Picking Group on Facebook or Twitter to find out how you can get involved.

Recycle right - recycling is good for the environment because it helps reduce the amount of resources needed to make new items. Please make sure you recycle everything you can and use the right bin for the right waste You can find a simple guide to what goes in your bin on our website: chesterfield.gov.uk/recycling

Buy second hand or repair - new

electronics, white goods or clothes create a lot of emissions through the manufacturing process,

transport and the need to get rid of old items. Instead of buying new try shopping around and choosing second hand where possible. You could also repair items and extend their useable life. The Chesterfield Repair Café takes place every month and they can help you repair a wide variety of items.

Calculate your carbon footprint -

understanding your own carbon emissions and where you can make further changes to reduce your impact is important. The World Wide Fund for Nature (WWF) has developed a carbon footprint tool which can help you make more changes to your lifestyle: footprint.wwf.org.uk

Share what you're doing - climate change

affects everyone, even those who haven't been born yet! Talking about your experience of the obvious signs of climate change, like more extreme weather, and explaining what you're doing to limit your own impact can help encourage more people to take real action. Improved customer experience technology introduced at Chesterfield leisure centres

Visitors to Queen's Park Sports Centre and The Healthy Living Centre can now enjoy several changes that will improve their experience

Investing in Staveley's future

Over £25m worth of projects which will benefit Staveley residents for generations to come have been given the official go ahead, after Government approved the package of all eleven projects within the Staveley Town Deal Programme.

It is a significant milestone for the range of projects that will receive funding through the Towns Fund, which are being delivered by a variety of organisations including Chesterfield Borough Council.

Councillor Tricia Gilby, Leader of the council and Vice Chair of the Town Deal Board, said: "The Town Deal represents a once in lifetime opportunity for Staveley and its residents. Each project is fantastic in its own right, but together they are truly transformative for the entire area. We want everyone to benefit from this investment and to understand how each of these projects can enhance Staveley and the local community."

Ivan Fomin, Chair of the Staveley Town Deal Board and Managing Director of Staveley-based MSE Hiller, said: "The projects that are being funded through the Town Deal are designed to complement one another and have been developed in response to the challenges and opportunities in Staveley. The project sponsors have worked hard to get to this point, and we are now moving into delivering these projects and ensuring that they can benefit everyone in Staveley."

The eleven projects, which are sponsored by a variety of groups including local councils, community groups and businesses, are highlighted below.

Staveley 21

This is a significant regeneration and revitalisation project in Staveley town centre led by Chesterfield Borough Council. It is based around the masterplan developed in 2021. It aims to make Staveley town centre a more attractive place with better connectivity that will boost business confidence and create a better leisure and retail offer for residents and visitors.

Staveley Miners Welfare Football Club (Skills Academy)

Staveley Miners Welfare Football Club is creating a new education facility where young people will

have the opportunity to achieve qualifications in sport and related subjects. It includes the creation of dedicated classroom space above the existing club house. The club will also make improvements to the car park near to the Chantry Playing Fields which will improve access for their youth teams, and for users of Poolsbrook Country Park and the Trans Pennine Trail.

Staveley Waterside

Derbyshire County Council will use funding to support the first phase of Staveley Waterside, a mixed-use development centred around the Staveley Canal Basin. This phase will include the creation of an access road, pontoons to create moorings, a café and flexible space for small businesses. This will encourage more people to visit the canal while also creating new space for ten businesses.

Wheels to Work

Wheels to Work is a Derbyshire County Council project, focused on ensuring everyone can access employment and training opportunities by providing bicycles and e-scooters for those with limited transport options and no access to private vehicles. This will make it easier for residents to access more employment opportunities whilst also reducing the impact of transport on the environment.

Staveley Hall Conference Centre

Staveley Town Council aims to use its funding to extend the historic Staveley Hall to create a new, flexible events centre (shown above). This project aims to attract new visitors as well as providing facilities for the community. Under the plans, the café will be extended and new event space which can be used by the community and businesses will be created.

Derbyshire Rail Industry Innovation Vehicle (DRIIVe)

DRIIVe is a modern rail innovation and training centre that will be located next to Barrow Hill Roundhouse. It will provide 1,423 sqm of floor space made up of classroom and workshop training areas, and specialist research and development facilities including a digital laboratory and commercial offices. The facility will support a network of speciality training providers – offering rail-related education from level 2 through to postgraduate training and research. By year five it aims to support around 270 trainees, supporting local people to access highly skilled careers in the industry.

Chesterfield Canal Restoration

The Canal Trust is restoring a stretch of our historic canal by extending it from the existing limit at Eckington Road. Works include the reconstruction of 850m of canal channel, two new bridges, a new lock and over 3km of footpath improvements along the towpath - connecting to existing networks, including the Trans Pennine Trail. This will lead to a 20% increase in visitors to the town, boosting the amount of money spent in the local economy.



The Construction Skills Hub is an onsite construction training centre that will enhance existing construction training provision by providing more opportunity for practical skills development. Acting as a catalyst for construction-related training and employment, the hub will initially be situated at the Devonshire Group's Mastin Moor site which has planning permission for 650 homes, a care facility, local centre and extensive parkland.

Hartington Industrial Park

Hartington Industrial Park is a 20-hectare site that has outline planning permission for an industrial and warehouse development that will create more local jobs near to the successful Markham Vale site. The Town Deal funding will support the development of infrastructure and other work needed to bring forward the development. This will create around 70,000sqm of new commercial floorspace which will create more employment opportunities for the town.

Barrow Hill Railway Station

This project aims to reinstate Barrow Hill Railway Station to create better public transport connections between Staveley, Chesterfield and Sheffield. In June 2022, the Government announced that a bid to reinstate the Barrow Hill Line will move forward to the next stage of funding and development, as part of the Restoring Your Railways initiative.

Councillor Jill Mannion-Brunt, cabinet member for health and wellbeing, said: "Fortunately, Chesterfield is a very safe place to live but, like all areas, we know anti-social behaviour can be an issue – and it can have a huge impact on people's lives so we're committed to doing all we can to tackle the problem.

"Listening to local communities, and working closely with our partners, is at the heart of our new approach. It also takes account of recent changes in the law around anti-social behaviour to ensure we are using all the powers available to us to help prevent nuisance in the first place, and that we can take proportionate enforcement action when needed."

Highlights include:


